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Our Christian Values

Whole School Worship

At St George's we follow the NATRE scheme of work for RE and this we bespoke so that it is mirrored in whole school worship. Each half term/term we will have a different theme that will be displayed around the school and in each classroom. Our whole school worship will take one year to complete. This is to ensure that our values and key elements of Christianity are fully embedded with the pupils of St George's. All worship will follow an order of service and will include hymns and prayer. All of whole school worship will focus on teachings of the Bible. Prayers and worship should be led by a mixture of SLT, the local Reverend, staff and our children. The school will follow the liturgical calendar for key Christian celebrations. We have whole school worship focusing on the following:

- Monday: School Worship in Church-led by the Vicar. Alternate weeks KS1 and KS2.
- Tuesday: Songs of Praise
- Wednesday: No Outsiders, PSHCE
- Thursday: Collective worship in class, led by class teachers.
- Friday: Celebration Worship in KS Halls

Lighting of the candle

When all of the pupils have gathered the candle(s) are lit to signal the start of worship.

Welcome

We greet each other with one of the Christian greetings:

- **Anglican Greetings to be used at the start Collective Worship**
 - **The Lord is Here His Spirit is with us**
 - **The Lord be with you and also with you**
 - **Grace, mercy and peace from God our Father and the Lord Jesus Christ be with you. And also with you**
 - **This is the day that the Lord has made
Let us rejoice and be glad in it**
 - *(From Easter day to Pentecost)*
**Alleuia. Christ is risen.
He is risen indeed. Alleuia**

Learning

Teaching of the key message through the use of drama, visual images, storytelling, puppetry or poetry.

Reflecting

The reflecting element encourages everyone to consider how the Bible story or stimulus has resonated with or challenged them.

Hymn

Pupils will sing together a traditional hymn or Christian song linked with the half termly Christian Value theme or daily theme.

Responding

Responding provides an opportunity to consider how God might be challenging those present in the worship to “step out” and play their part in making a difference in the works either as individuals or as part of the whole school community.

Dismissal

Collective worship is ended with one of the following:

- Go in ~~peace~~ to love and serve the Lord
In the name of Christ Amen
- Go in the ~~peace~~ of Christ **Thanks be to God**
- Let us ~~bless~~ the Lord. **Thanks be to God**
- (*From Easter day to Pentecost*)
Go in the ~~peace~~ of Christ Alleuia, alleuia
Thanks be to God. Alleuia, alleuia.

Extinguishing of the candle

When the act of Worship is over the candle will be extinguished.

In Class Worship

As well as whole school worship we also have in class worship. In class worship takes place twice a week and follows the same order as the whole school worship. We also expand our worship with the ‘No Outsiders’ curriculum and PSHCE themes. Flip charts are written by staff and are to be shared on the shared area to ensure consistency across the Key Stages.

Daily Prayer

As well as in class worship, we also have daily prayers that are said in class. These prayers are led by the class teacher and the members of the worship group. The following prayers are said at these times of the day:

Lunchtime Prayer: Said before lunch

Home Time Prayer: Said at the end of the day

Worship Group

The Worship group is made up of 2 pupils from most year groups who were nominated by their class teachers. They meet every weekly with the RE lead and or Headteacher. The role of the Worship group is to support school with whole school worship and in class worship. Worship group pupils are expected to read school prayers and begin worship by lighting the class candles.

Worship Area

Every classroom has a worship area. Each worship area looks exactly the same with the same items on it.

The worship area must have the following items on it:

- Bible
- Cross
- Candle
- The theme displayed
- Christian Values displayed
- Prayer box
- Big question
- Activities
- Prayer paper

Pupils are encouraged to use the worship areas in class to reflect on the themes and stories from worship, to answer key questions on display, to

participate in activities provided or to write prayers for the prayer tree. Pupils are encouraged to use this space as often as they like during the school day.

Pupil Spirituality

At St George's we have a moral responsibility to ensure we are providing for the pupil's spirituality in school. This is reflected through the whole school and in class worship as well as through the school prayer tree and the peace garden.

Prayer Tree

In the KS2 downstairs corridor we have the prayer tree. Pupils are encouraged to reflect on the themes and stories covered in whole school worship and asked to write their own thoughtful and reflective prayers. Prayers are written on leaves and then these prayers are then placed on the prayer tree. During whole school worship prayers from the prayer tree may be chosen to read out to the school as part of worship. Staff are also encouraged to write their own prayers to share with the pupils.



Governors

The Governors are made up of different stake holders from our school, Church and community. One of the purposes of the Governors is to monitor and evaluate the provision for worship and R.E in school and ensure the school are promoting our Christian values. The governors are welcomed into school on a regular basis to share worship, look at RE books and monitor RE prayer areas. The Re lead talks to the governors about RE action plan and plans for the future.

Parental Involvement

At the beginning of every half term we will send home the Home School Values sheet for parents. This sheet has ideas, stories and activities based around the bible and on the theme, we are focusing on for that half term. This sheet will also be displayed on the school website.

FASCINATING FACTS

Friendship Bands

Friendship bracelets are usually handmade and given to a special friend. According to American tradition you must wear the bracelet until the ends break and it falls off naturally. In this way you honour the love and hard work your friend put in to making it!




Raksha Bandhan

One special type of friendship bracelet is a Rakhi. Each year, normally in August, many Hindus mark Raksha Bandhan. The festival is a celebration of family life and in particular the relationship between brothers and sisters. They remember and talk about special times together, and think about loyalty, closeness, trust and their everlasting friendship.

- Traditionally sisters tie a sacred thread, a Rakhi, on to their brothers' wrists.
- In response the brothers give their sisters a gift promising to help them whenever the need arises and to always protect them.
- Celebrations continue throughout the day with gifts of sweets and special food as families enjoy the time they share together.

A dog is a man's best friend

Near the village of Beddgelert in North Wales is a beautiful sculpture of a very special friend.

According to legend, the monument marks the resting place of the faithful dog, Gelert, who once belonged to the medieval Welsh Prince, Llewelyn the Great. A tombstone tells the story of a faithful day when Llewelyn went out hunting leaving the faithful hound, Gelert, to guard his young son. On his return Gelert sprang to greet his master, but Llewelyn noticed some blood on his fur. He rushed inside his house. To his horror the first thing he saw was his son's cot. It was empty!





















The frantic father turned on the dog, thinking he must have harmed the boy. He killed Gelert there and then with his sword. At that moment a child's cry rang out through the house. Llewelyn searched and discovered his boy unharmed, but nearby lay the body of a mighty wolf which Gelert had killed before it attacked the small child.

Prince Llewelyn is said never to have smiled again and with tears of sadness he buried Gelert in this place, which became known as "the grave of Gelert", or in Welsh, Beddgelert.

Teaching and Learning

As a Church school R.E has as much importance in the school curriculum as English and Maths. R.E is taught as a discreet subject and is taught once a week for 50 minutes in every class from EYFS2 to Year 6. Our R.E curriculum covers a range of topics with a mostly Christian theme, and planning and resources for the topics are saved on to the school server.



Marking and feedback

Marking and feedback given to pupils must be to the same quality as we would see in English or Maths books (see Feedback Policy). Work should be marked to the learning intention and opportunities should be given to pupils to reflect on their learning with key questions. Pupils should respond to this in purple pen.

R.E Displays

Every class in school must have an R.E display either inside or outside of the classroom. R.E displays in school should be topic based. These displays should be used as a working wall, where work gets added to the display regularly. The display should be interactive with key questions for pupils to think about. Pupils should add work to the display as and when is necessary.

Assessment

Assessment is recorded against the end of key stage expectations.

End of Key Stage Expectations

By the end of Key Stage 1 children are expected to:
• talk about God as creator of the world who loves us.
• know that God is three in one, Father, Son and Holy Spirit.
• be able to retell both the nativity and Easter stories.
• use religious words to talk about the celebrations of Christmas, Easter and Pentecost.
• know that Christians believe Jesus is the Son of God who died on the cross and rose again.
• know that Jesus had 12 special friends called disciples.
• know that the Bible is our holy book and it contains God's big story, the salvation plan.
• be able to retell stories of Jesus' miracles.
• have visited a church and confidently talk about their experience and what they have learnt.
• have had opportunity to ask reflective questions that wonder about Christian practice, values and beliefs.
• be able to give examples of how Christians, put their beliefs into action.
• know the names and significance of holy books from other faiths.
• know the places where people of other faiths worship.
• be developing a sense of their own values and the values of others.
• have experienced taking part in the celebration of Harvest Festival.

By the end of Key Stage 2 children are expected to:

Monitoring

Members of the SLT and the Governors conduct the monitoring of R.E and Worship in school. One of the main purposes of the Governors is to ensure that the Christian Values of the school are promoted and underpin everything. Throughout the year we will monitor:
